

Minister Odongo Commends UNCTAD, WIPO, and WTO for Economic Support to Uganda during Working Visit to the UN in Geneva.

Geneva - The Minister for Foreign Affairs, Hon. Gen. Odongo Jeje Abubaker recognised the support rendered by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) towards Uganda's economic development, and aimed at enhancing trade, investment, and sustainable development. This was during the Global Leaders Forum, at the commemoration of UNCTAD's 60th Anniversary, under the theme "charting a new development course in a changing world," which took place on June 13, 2024, where he represented H.E. Yoweri Kaguta Museveni at the UN in Geneva.

Gen. Odongo revealed that the Summit of the Future is expected to demonstrate that international cooperation can effectively tackle current challenges. Notably, the UN Secretary-General, Antonia Guterres emphasised that the world cannot afford splits into rival blocs and called for a global economy to implement the Sustainable Development Goals. On her part, the UNCTAD Secretary-General Rebeca Grynspan recognised the digital economy as a powerful new engine of development, transforming trade into an intangible and scalable activity while risking deeper divides and inequalities.

On the sidelines, Hon. Gen. Odongo held bilateral meetings with the Director-General (DG) of the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) and Dr Ngozi Ikonjo-Iweala DG of the World Trade Organization (WTO) at their respective headquarters in Geneva. Dr. Ngozi emphasised the importance of diversifying the economy for a more effective African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA), adding that the WTO supports Uganda in implementing AfCFTA protocols and reducing trade barriers through the Trade Facilitation Agreement.

DG Tang thanked the Minister for Uganda's role in the Traditional Knowledge Convention negotiations and reported that since January 2022, WIPO added Uganda to project support, potentially expanding to Geographical Indications. Hon. Odongo expressed gratitude for WIPO's support to Uganda, "we thank you for your support over the years, including project support to the establishment of 34 Technology and Innovation Centres; building capacity for Patent Examiners and Drafters, development of a National Action Plan to protect and benefit from Uganda's traditional knowledge, genetic resources and traditional cultural expressions and the development of the National Intellectual Property Policy in 2019," said Odongo.

Uganda and South Korea Forge Stronger Ties with a New Diplomatic Mission in Seoul, and Enhanced Economic Cooperation.

Seoul - Uganda and South Korea are poised to take their relationship to the next level. This was evident at the recently concluded Korea-Africa Summit in Seoul, where Uganda's high-powered delegation, led by Vice President Jessica Alupo, forged new partnerships and secured increased economic cooperation.

One of the most significant announcements was Uganda's plan to open a resident embassy in South Korea. A permanent diplomatic presence signifies a commitment to maximizing the benefits of the existing ten Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) between the two nations.

Furthermore, two new MoUs were signed during the Summit, focusing on trade and investment promotion, along with loan financing (increasing South Korea's concessional loan to Uganda from \$34 million to \$500 million for 2024-2028). These agreements will create a more predictable and stable environment for Korean investors venturing into the Ugandan market.

During a bilateral discussion on June 2, 2024, in Seoul, Hon. Oryem Henry Okello, Minister of State for Foreign Affairs in-charge of International Affairs, and Deputy Foreign Minister Hon. Chung Byungwon of the Republic of Korea, delved into critical issues such as climate change, food security, supply chain stability, and health security.

These topics which are essential for Africa's growth aligned with the summit's theme, "The Future We Make Together: Shared Growth, Sustainability, and Solidarity."

"We're excited about the prospect of a trade agreement and a significant increase in Korean loan commitments," stated Uganda's Minister for International Affairs. He revealed plans to propose several infrastructure and energy projects for Korean funding, potentially unlocking up to \$500 million in concessional loans over the next five years. This financial support could be instrumental in propelling Uganda's development initiatives.

South Korea, on the other hand, sees Uganda as a strategic partner in Africa. Deputy Foreign Minister Byung-won emphasized Korea's commitment to knowledge and technology sharing. Programs focusing on capacity building, technology transfer, and skill development will be at the forefront of their collaborative efforts. This expertise exchange aims to bolster Uganda's industrial growth and equip its workforce with future-proof skills.

The Ugandan delegation actively participated in various side events, delving into critical areas like tourism development, agricultural advancement, healthcare security, Information & Communication Technologies, and infrastructure development. A Business Summit at Lotte Hotel, Seoul, further explored opportunities for industrialization, trade promotion, and job creation.

Gen. Odongo Decries Slow Negotiations for UN Security Council Reform.

Algiers - Minister of Foreign Affairs Hon. Gen Odongo Jeje Abubaker called out the sluggish nature of the Inter-Governmental Negotiation (IGN) for the UN Security Council, observing convergences on a number of clusters within major negotiating groups.

These remarks were made during his speech at the 11th Ministerial Meeting of the African Union Committee of Ten (C10) on the reform of the United Nations Security Council, which took place on June 10, 2024, in Algiers, Algeria.

Gen. Odongo observed that despite having some convergences on a number of clusters within major negotiating groups, there are simply many lacking common grounds to move the process towards fruitful intergovernmental negotiations.

The conference allowed C-10 Foreign Ministers to discuss the status of IGNs at the UN General Assembly, in order to devise strategies to advance the Common African Position and determine the next stages of the IGN process.

Uganda & UNDP to Strengthen Collaboration on Climate Change, Sustainable Development.



Kampala - The Ministry of Foreign Affairs hosted a high-level meeting between Hon. John Mulimba, Minister of State for Foreign Affairs (Regional Affairs), and Ms. Nwanne Vwede Obahor, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) Resident Representative, on June 12, 2024. The two discussed initiatives to combat climate change and enhance agricultural sustainability.

Both parties acknowledged Uganda's crucial role as a food basket in the region and explored avenues for bolstering agriculture, particularly through projects supporting women groups and the cassava value chain production. UNDP's commitment to providing equipment and funding for these initiatives was met with strong support from the Ugandan government.

Furthermore, the meeting highlighted UNDP's broad spectrum of support across various sectors, including natural resources, trade, tourism, and minerals. Minister Mulimba emphasized the importance of collaboration between UNDP and the Ugandan government in achieving shared development goals. Ms. Obahor echoed this sentiment, underscoring UNDP's longstanding partnership with Uganda and its commitment to furthering mutual objectives.

They also explored new areas of cooperation, particularly in promoting regional integration within the East African Community (EAC). Hon. John Mulimba emphasized Uganda's efforts to engage border communities and manage cross-border natural resources, highlighting the potential for joint initiatives with UNDP's support.

IEC Explores the Wonders of Queen Elizabeth National Park.

In a collaborative effort between the International Economic Cooperation department and the Uganda Tourism Board (UTB), a delegation of 15 delegates embarked on a comprehensive exploration of Western Uganda, focusing on the iconic Queen Elizabeth National Park among other attractions. Led by Connie Nuwagaba, a counselor in the department, the expedition aimed to deepen understanding and promote the park's potential for international tourism.

Queen Elizabeth National Park (QENP), sprawling over 1,978 square kilometers, serves as a sanctuary for an astonishing diversity of wildlife, i.e. 10 primates, 95 mammals, etc. The team's game drive provided close encounters with lions, elephants, kobs, and a myriad of bird species (618), showcasing Uganda's rich ecological tapestry.

Beyond its natural beauty, the team observed ongoing challenges such as poaching and habitat degradation caused by human activities. They noted the park's dedicated efforts in anti-poaching measures and habitat restoration projects, crucial for preserving Uganda's natural heritage and supporting sustainable tourism.

Peace Nankinga, the Personal Secretary in the IEC Dpartnment, noted that several staff have never been to a single national park in Uganda. "The trip offered invaluable insights into Uganda's natural treasures," remarked Connie Nuwagaba. "It reinforced the importance of showcasing these attractions globally to attract tourism and investment that benefit both our economy and conservation efforts." she added.

"Every ambassador and foreign representative ought to be taken around this country to feel and witness the natural endowments that we have in terms of tourism among several other investment opportunities which have to be marketed outside the country," Ms. Nuwagaba emphasised.

"This initiative will not only enhance our understanding of several endowments but also equip us with knowledge of several investment opportunities that can be sold to investors out of Uganda," urged Peace Nankinga, a delegate on the trip. During discussions, the delegates emphasized the need for collaborative efforts to promote Uganda's tourism potential. They highlighted plans to engage international partners in joint marketing campaigns and infrastructure development aimed at enhancing visitor experiences.

The delegates appealed to the Uganda Tourism Board to continue providing branded material and other informative merchandise to embassies and foreign missions, which can be used to attract tourists and investors. On his part, Daniel Irunga, the 'Explore Uganda' brand manager, said the visit to Queen Elizabeth was a continuation of an earlier initiative to have UTB and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs implement a joint international marketing strategy, support crisis communications, and collaborate with diaspora associations to promote investment in Uganda.

Both entities remain committed to implementing this unified strategy aimed at positioning Uganda as a premier tourism destination and conservation leader on the global stage.

Uganda Spearheads Regional Economic Transformation at Joint Commercial Diplomacy Retreat.

In a bold move to boost and strengthen regional economic growth and development, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs convened a historic retreat bringing together heads of diplomatic missions in the Ring States. The event, held under the theme "Enhanced Economic Growth and Development through Promotion of Economic and Commercial Diplomacy," ran from June 11th to 14th 2024, at Serena Kigo.

The retreat aimed to bolster missions' ability to attract regional economic cooperation and investments. It convened government officials, private sector leaders, and industry experts to discuss strategies for enhancing economic and commercial diplomacy, with a focus on the regional economic outlook, energy sector development, Uganda's trade performance, and the private sector's role in driving socio-economic growth.

Hon. John Mulimba, the Minister of State for Regional Cooperation, emphasized the need for Uganda's plans to align with the National Development Plan (NDP 4) and highlighted the significance of a clear economic diplomacy strategy. "We must ensure our initiatives are in line with the NDP 4 to promote sustainable development and economic growth," he stated.

Mr. Bagiire Vincent Waiswa, Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, emphasized the retreat as a crucial platform for addressing regional challenges and exploring opportunities for economic growth. "This retreat is a crucial platform for addressing regional challenges and exploring opportunities for economic growth," he said, stressing the need for a robust resource mobilization strategy to access lucrative regional markets.

A key highlight of the retreat was the call to action by Ms. Lilly Ajarova, CEO of Uganda Tourism Board (UTB), who urged Uganda's missions abroad to support tourism efforts.

"We are calling upon our missions abroad to support us in branding, marketing, and attracting investors to our 'Explore Uganda' campaign," she said. Ms. Ajarova noted the success of past collaborations and expressed confidence in achieving even more positive results with continued support.

Amb. Richard Kabonero, Head of Regional Economic Cooperation, outlined a new framework aimed at promoting economic growth through commercial diplomacy.

The Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Finance Planning and Economic Development, Mr. Ramathan Ggoobi tasked Uganda's Ambassadors to attract credible investors and secure markets for exports, urging them to leverage their diplomatic presence to drive economic growth. He emphasized the importance of negotiating non-tariff barriers to boost Uganda's export market within the East African Community and COMESA.

Amb. Richard Kabonero explained that, "The MoFA has developed a framework to guide our missions abroad in marketing Uganda, increasing exports, attracting foreign direct investments, and boosting tourism." The retreat also addressed barriers to trade, the importance of data and communication infrastructure, and the need for a regional data framework to improve data affordability and access to sea cables.

Ms. Julianne Mweheire, Director of Industry Affairs and Content Development at the Uganda Communications Commission (UCC), highlighted the significant progress in reducing data costs and the shift in data consumption trends.

The retreat concluded with a draft action plan for economic and commercial diplomacy for FY 2024/2025, showcasing Uganda's commitment to strengthening regional economic ties and promoting economic growth and development in the East African region. The participants expressed optimism about the future and emphasized the importance of continued collaboration & strategic initiatives to achieve their economic goals.

This year's celebrations saw numerous Christians flock to the Namugongo Shrine. President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni expressed gratitude towards the Uganda Martyrs for fostering Christianity. "The blood of the Martyrs watered the seed of Christianity. Their death served as a catalyst for the growth of Christianity," he said.

GLOBAL CELEBRATIONS:

- Rome: On June 8, the Uganda Embassy in Rome, the Uganda Embassy to the Holy See in Berlin, and the Uganda Ecclesiastical Community in Rome hosted global Martyrs Day celebrations at the White Fathers' Headquarters.
- Johannesburg: The Catholic Diocese of Johannesburg, along with Ugandan clergy and Christians in Gauteng Province, designated Mother of Mercy Shrine in Magaliesburg as the annual pilgrimage site for Uganda Martyrs Day celebrations, observed on June 15.
- Los Angeles: St. Charles Lwanga, Daudi Okello, and Jildo Irwa's relics are preserved at St. Genevieve Catholic Church in Panorama City. Martyrs Day is observed on the third Sunday of June. Mr. Kigoye Damian, a Ugandan from LA, visited Uganda and brought back a wooden sculpture funded by Ugandans in LA.
- Cologne: On June 8, Ugandans celebrated in Cologne, Germany. The celebration, officiated by Fr. Klaus Peter Vosen, included over 100 attendees, including Ugandans living in Germany, Uganda's Ambassador to Germany, Amb. Stephen Mubiru, his staff, and visiting Ugandan MPs attending UN Climate Change meetings. Priests from Nigeria, Zimbabwe, Kenya, and Uganda also assisted.











Ugandan Diaspora Community Shines as Key Driver of Economic Growth.

The Ugandan diaspora community has emerged as a crucial contributor to the country's economic development, with remittances surpassing traditional foreign direct investment and official development assistance.

According to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, remittances from the diaspora reached \$1.42 billion (UGX 5.5 trillion) in the last 12 months, a 13.4% increase from the previous year. This significant influx of foreign currency has helped stabilize the economy, invest in real estate, and support household expenditures.

Beyond remittances, the diaspora community has invested in businesses, created jobs, and transferred skills and knowledge to Uganda. Amb. Johnny Muhindo, Head of the Diaspora Department at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, emphasized the diaspora's role during the Joint Retreat of Uganda Missions from the Ring States.

He highlighted the need for a comprehensive national diaspora policy to fully harness their contributions and address the challenges they face. "We need a comprehensive national diaspora policy to fully harness their contributions and address the challenges they face," Amb. Muhindo said.

Despite their significant contributions, Ugandans living abroad encounter numerous challenges, including legal and immigration issues, employment and economic instability, access to healthcare, mental anguish, and difficulties in transferring funds to their home country.

Ambassador Muhindo stressed the importance of addressing these challenges and creating an enabling environment for the diaspora to invest and contribute to Uganda's development. "The diaspora community is eager to contribute to Uganda's development, and we believe that with the right policies and support, they can make a very significant impact," he explained. "We urge the government to prioritize the diaspora policy and create an enabling environment for them to invest and contribute to Uganda."

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs' Diaspora Department has outlined tasks to enhance diaspora engagement, including completing the Regulatory Impact Assessment, launching the National Diaspora Policy, promoting diaspora agri-preneurs, and creating a diaspora bond. The department also plans to collaborate with international organizations to bridge the financing gap in implementing its mandate.


"Countries that have recognized the value of their diaspora population to development efforts have instituted policies, legal and institutional frameworks that harness diaspora contributions," said Ambassador Muhindo. "We must do the same to reap the benefits of our diaspora community."

The retreat, attended by diplomats, government officials, and diaspora representatives, called for a concerted effort to support the diaspora community and promote Uganda's development. Participants agreed on the need for a coordinated approach to engage the diaspora community and harness their contributions to Uganda's growth.

London - Uganda is set to launch direct flights between Entebbe & London, a significant milestone announced by the Uganda Mission in London on June 19, 2024. The groundbreaking event featured a team from Uganda Airlines engaging with UK aviation authorities, the business community, and the Ugandan diaspora in preparation for the direct flights.

Uganda Airlines secured slots for departures and landings at London Heathrow Airport after receiving its two Airbus A330–800 Neo aircraft in December 2020 and February 2021. Despite this, no trips had been made to the UK due to delays caused by the need for updated certification from the UK Civil Aviation Authority and the European Aviation Safety Agency.

Aviation Development Chief Analyst, James Pearson, highlighted the potential market, noting that over 84,000 passengers flew on the Entebbe-London route in 2019, making Entebbe the second-largest unserved market from Africa to London.

The introduction of the London route is expected to further enhance Uganda's connectivity and boost economic ties with Europe. Ms. Bamuturaki emphasized the strategic importance of these flights in strengthening Uganda's position as a key player in regional and international aviation. "The direct flights to London mark a new chapter in Uganda Airlines' growth and our commitment to connecting Uganda to the world," she stated.

Both the MoFA and Uganda Airlines are optimistic that the new route will significantly impact tourism, business travel, and the diaspora community, providing a seamless travel experience and fostering greater economic cooperation between Uganda and the UK.



Ugandans in Somalia Remit UGX 223 Million Daily Back Home.

Kampala - Remittances from Ugandan expatriates in Somalia have increased to \$60,000 daily, approximately shs223 million, according to the Ugandan embassy in Mogadishu.

This was revealed by Uganda's Ambassador to Somalia, Prof. Sam Tulya-Muhika at the Joint Regional Economic & Commercial Diplomacy retreat which ran from June 11 to June 13, 2024.

Amb Tulya-Muhika (pictured) recognized UPDF's role in promoting peace in Somalia as part of the AU Transition Mission, aiding in the export of various goods.

He highlighted the growth in exports between Uganda and Somalia, increasing from \$3.1 million to \$8.2 million since the establishment of the Joint Permanent Commission.

The Permanent Secretary Bagiire Vincent Waiswa, emphasized the importance of Uganda's foreign missions in promoting East African integration and accessing new markets.

Amb. Elly Kamahungye, Director Regional and International Economic Affairs, praised Uganda's 38 diplomatic missions for attracting foreign direct investment through economic diplomacy, aiming to boost exports and the economy.



Uganda Coffee Blooms at Coffex Exhibition in Istanbul, Turkey.







Uganda was chosen as the focus country for the 2024 coffex edition due to the consistency of the Embassy in promoting Uganda Coffee in Turkey and participating in coffex since 2020.

Statistics show that Turkey has a population of 86 million and a GDP of 1.14 trillion USD creating significant market for Ugandan exports, particularly coffee. Istanbul, the country's commercial center, was the most visited city in the world in 2023, followed by London, the United Kingdom, Dubai, UAE and Antalya. Turkey's GDP per capita is \$44,900, making it a vital destination for Ugandan businesses.

Records show that Uganda coffee exports to Turkey have been improving exponentially with 2,260 bags in 2019 to 44,019 bags in 2023. This exponential jump in coffee exports is attributed to the efforts of Uganda Embassy in Ankara and the unending support from UCDA in partnership with the Embassy & MoFA in promoting Uganda coffee abroad.

My China Experience: A Journey of Learning and Discovery By Guma Jeremiah

The experience of traveling abroad begins with ensuring you have adequate travel documentation. Obtaining a visa can be a challenging task, but once you have it, you are almost 90 percent certain of your trip. The Embassy of the People's Republic of China facilitated my visa within 48 hours.

The purpose of my 14-day stay in China (20th June to 3rd July) was to attend a Seminar on International Development Cooperation for Uganda. The fully-funded trip was sponsored by the Ministry of Commerce of the People's Republic of China and organized by the Hunan International Business Vocational College in Changsha Province.

My eagerness to understand China's national conditions, particularly their experiences in poverty reduction and alleviation, was greatly rewarded. The program was rich in content, covering various aspects. We learned about the development of China's economy, society, and politics since the founding of the People's Republic of China, as well as its reform and opening-up. The transformation was astounding, showing how far the nation has come.



We discussed effective measures and useful experiences on eliminating absolute poverty. Hearing firsthand accounts of success stories from remote villages was incredibly inspiring. The session on China's Modernization and Sino-African Common Development explored the impact of China's modernization on cooperation and development between China and Africa. The parallels and potential for shared growth were eye-opening. The importance and impact of actively engaging in international development assistance to expand international cooperation were highlighted using iconic case studies.

We explored the importance, implementation methods, achievements, and challenges of friendly cooperation between cities. The stories of city partnerships fostering economic and cultural exchange were particularly memorable. The achievements and future development aspirations of the Belt and Road Initiative were discussed, stressing the ambitious and inspiring vision for global connectivity and cooperation.

We received lectures from highly acclaimed experts, including Wu Chuanhua, Secretary-General of the China-Africa Institute, Liu Qi Feng, Deputy Director of the Office of the Foreign Affairs Committee of the Hunan Provincial Committee of the Communist Party of China, Li Peng, Deputy Director of the Hunan Provincial Department of Commerce, Jiang Yanhui, Professor and Doctoral Supervisor at the Department of Accounting, School of Business Administration, Hunan University, and Xie Yuhua, Professor and Doctoral Supervisor at the Department of Business Administration, School of Business Administration, Hunan University.

During the seminar, we visited the China-Africa Economic and Trade Cooperation Promotion Innovation Demonstration Park, Yuan Longping High-Tech Agriculture Co., Ltd., and Chengdu City, where we experienced the lifetime opportunity of seeing the pandas. The sheer number of tourists got me thinking about what Uganda can do to draw similar attention to the mountain gorillas that are unique to our nation. One of the most striking observations was the prevalence of electric vehicles (EVs) from various brands. It was clear that green energy is the future, and China is at the forefront of this transformation.

We also had the chance to visit the historic Yuelu Academy. Established in 976 AD during the Song dynasty, the academy has long been a bastion of Chinese culture and values. Learning that Chairman Mao was an alumnus added a profound sense of connection to China's revolutionary past and its commitment to education. Another highlight was our visit to Du Fu's Thatched Cottage in Chengdu. This serene spot, dating back to the Tang dynasty in the 7th century, was captivating. The preservation of such historical sites underscores the importance of history to the Chinese people and how it shapes their future.

The kindness and hospitality of the Chinese people left a lasting impression on me. From sharing meals with locals to navigating bustling markets with friendly vendors, the warmth of the people was palpable. The variety of food was amazing, from exotic local dishes like Peking duck and hotpot to international cuisine. Each meal was an adventure, offering a taste of China's rich culinary heritage. Shopping was another delightful experience, with options ranging from world-renowned brands to more affordable outlet stores. Walking through glitzy malls and bustling street markets, I marveled at the endless array of goods available. The infrastructure in China is nothing short of spectacular, featuring efficient domestic flights, high-speed railways, and well-maintained metro stations. Traveling from city to city was seamless and comfortable.

Our course coordinators worked tirelessly to ensure that all participants were well taken care of. They made sure to even arrange special meals for those with dietary restrictions. This dedication was evident during the emotional sending-off ceremony and last-day goodbyes, which testified to the bond built over the two weeks.

My China experience was not just about learning but also about building friendships and understanding a culture rich in history and modern achievements. Every moment was filled with discovery. The most vital lesson I took away from this journey was the timeless wisdom of Confucian ideologies: the importance of education, respect for others, and the pursuit of harmony in society. These principles were evident in every aspect of Chinese life and the country's remarkable progress. China, now the second-largest economy in the world, is undoubtedly destined for the very top. My journey left me with valuable insights, lasting memories, and a deep appreciation for a nation that harmoniously blends its ancient traditions with modern advancements.

The event celebrated both established filmmakers and emerging talent through its student film category, fostering a supportive environment for the next generation of Ugandan filmmakers.


Established in 2013, UFF aims to promote the growth of the local film industry by showcasing Ugandan films and providing a platform for filmmakers to network and gain international recognition.
